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| Abstract | <p>Monitoring progress towards decent work is a long-standing concern for the ILO's constituents. The ILO Declaration on Social Justice for a Fair Globalization recommends that member States consider "the establishment of appropriate indicators or statistics, if necessary with the assistance of the ILO, to monitor and evaluate progress made". The Governing Body has debated the measurement of decent work on various occasions and provided guidance on the main principles that should guide measurement.¹ These include that all four strategic objectives should be covered adequately, including fundamental principles and rights at work; that a composite index that could be used for the purpose of ranking countries should not be pursued; and that the approach should assist constituents to assess progress towards decent work in their country based on a set of indicators that is also available for other countries.</p> |
