	job profiles: demanding (high demands, low resources), resourceful (low

	demanding jobs evidenced the poorest well-being (high burnout and low work
	engagement). Resourceful as well as rich jobs were the most optimal job profiles:
	employees with such profiles reported the least burnout and the most work
	engagement. The discussion centres on the theoretical lessons learned from the
	differences among the job profiles, the practical importance of cluster analysis as
	a diagnostic tool and the presence of job resources.
